


What do you get the person who has every water toy? How about a shadow yacht to carry it all, which is exactly what the 220-meter (721.78-foot) Sea Axe support vessel was designed to do. With 2,529.52 square feet of deck space, Sea Axe was built to transport tenders, personal watercraft, sailing dinghies, kayaks and, naturally, the occasional submarine. She even has an optional hangar, designed to keep those toys protected from the elements during transoceanic voyages. Not simply a pack mule, this vessel boasts a top speed of 25 knots in most sea conditions, allowing her to keep pace with the mothership.
